## THE LORD LOVES A CHEERFUL GIVER

It's that time of year again in your presbytery office: the Discipleship and Administrative Umbrella Teams are crafting drafts of the Mission & Program and Administrative portions of the 2006 budget for presentation at the June presbytery meeting. It seems so mundane, even boring. But this work is essential for carrying out the mission of the presbytery as you have voted it in recent years.

Our Mission Statement begins, "We believe God is calling the Church to renewal and transformation that we may witness to the love of Jesus Christ in changing and challenging times. Huntingdon Presbytery seeks to discern and answer God's call as it gathers as Christ's community, challenges churches and members, equips churches and laity, supports ministers and shares in joint mission...." Using the spiritual, human and financial resources with which we have been blessed, together we seek to fulfill that mission statement. How does the practical budget enable our more conceptual mission to "sprout wings and fly"?

I've been here just over two years and have a better grasp of where we stand financially and how it all works than when we first met. The Administrative portion of our budget is funded almost exclusively by your per capita giving to the presbytery. The Mission & Program side of things is slightly more complex in funding structure. So... how does it all work? *continued on page 2*

## Presbytery Highlights:

The April 5 meeting of presbytery was chock full of information. Dan Ledford brought a report on his trip to Israel. General Presbyter Joy Kaufmann encouraged us to save October 14 & 15 for the Magnetic Church evangelism workshop with Andy Weeks. Phil Blake of the Presbyterian Foundation told us how to make our money do double duty for both us and our church. Jim Steiner of Presbyterian Homes asked for volunteers to assist the Homes in their work. Dave Benfer encouraged churches to send their youth to Krislund this summer. Ernie Walls and the Sturniolos reported that 8 people from 4 churches will represent us as the Huntingdon Presbytery mission team visiting the Pakh this summer. Christina Trimble told us that commissioners to the next Synod meeting will do hands on mission.

Joel Blunk encouraged churches to take up the Witness Offering, half of which stays in our congregations for programs that support children at risk, such as State College's mission in Wheeling, WV. (Those of you who support Joshua House, the Altoona Teen Ministry, Lumina Center in Lewistown or send needy children to Krislund on scholarship might consider this one.)

Presbytery took action to approve a roof repair loan for West Kish, extended the contract between Merry

### **The Administrative Portion**

This part of our presbytery's budget includes such items as:

- committee and umbrella team administrative expenses, eg, mileage reimbursement for those who take part,
- the major portion of the General Presbyter's salary and benefit package, including mileage reimbursement when she comes to visit your church,
- three-fifths of the Office Administrator/Resource Coordinator position (See below)
- all expenses related to the Stated Clerk and both treasurers,
- the annual audit or financial review,
- and a small part of the Presbytery Office expenses (See below)

While the budget sheets that Administrative Treasurer Liz Armstrong provides appear lengthy because of the item by item break-down, the basic categories are simply those listed above.

### **The Mission & Program Portion**

This part of our budget includes:

- all presbytery mission projects such as Pakh 5 Nan, Krislund Camp and The Presbyterian Homes,
- line items designed to help our congregations, such as Partnership with Churches in Transformation, and Christian Education Programs,
- portions of the Office Administrator/Resource Coordinator and General Presbyter positions (the parts that help enable the mission of the presbytery),
- the majority of the presbytery office expenses that help enable the mission of the presbytery,
- and all of the Pastoral Care Consultant position.

These categories are also quite straightforward, although some of the ways we make this side of the budget function appropriately are less so. For instance, when the presbytery votes to put our total budget in place, on the Mission & Program side, congregations may choose to give a unified General Mission Pledge, to designate their mission giving to particular line items (missions) or some combination of both. Jim Hanly, former chair of The Discipleship Umbrella Team, has always said, "We have 53 churches and 57 ways of doing mission giving!" That's true.

Sometimes the mission giving reflects the love of our people's hearts about favorite mission projects and doesn't line up with the budget we have voted. For instance, the Pakh 5 Nan line items are always "over-subscribed", and some of the less project oriented items are under-subscribed. We use the unified General Mission Pledge gifts to pay for those line items that are not fully subscribed by designated gifts. In the near future, the Discipleship Umbrella Team members hope to start making regular, clear reports to you at the presbytery meetings about how our giving matches (or doesn't!) with the budget we have voted into place. That way, if you see that some areas are already cared for and others are lacking, your congregations may wish to make mid-year adjustments in how you give your mission dollars.

We have some bank accounts on the Mission & Program side of the budget for particular mission items. But those funds are unavailable for use throughout the M & P portion of the budget because of their designations. For instance, we have a modest CD for Church Development/Redevelopment, and that is obviously to be used only for this designated purpose.

### **You are a Giving People**

Our congregations and members give generously and faithfully, and dare I say it, joyfully. On the other hand, because of designations in our giving, we will likely have to cut the Mission & Program portion of our budget for 2006, perhaps in a manner some will consider drastic. But your Discipleship and Administrative Umbrella Team members are seeking to be faithful to what you have said you all discern is God's will enacted through our budget. If, as you see the budget proposal in June, you have questions, please do not hesitate to ask any staff member, Al Wilson of the Administrative Umbrella Team or Ernie Walls of the Discipleship Umbrella Team for further clarity. We seek to serve you who comprise the churches that comprise our presbytery, in order that, together, we might serve Jesus Christ.

Back when I first became involved at the Presbytery level, I was a member of the "Spiritual Growth and Enrichment Committee". You see, they were called committees back then. Later the name of that committee was changed to "Spiritual Growth and Evangelism Committee". Suddenly the "E" word re-emerged. Up until that time, and for along time, the "E" word seemed to disappear from the Presbyterian vocabulary. Since coming back into vogue, the work "Evangelism" has undergone a number of interpretations and definition

However, it should be here noted, that even though the "E" word went into disuse, the practice of evangelism did not. Evangelism has always been integral part of Presbyterianism. Oh, not the radio and television version of evangelism, not the "revival meeting" approach, not the "pulpit pounding" methodology. But, by whatever definition you apply to the "E" word, Presbyterians have always believed and practiced what I believe Christ would see as true evangelism.

That being said, what does evangelism have to do with missions? I submit that the two are inseparable and the one cannot stand without the other. All too often, I'm afraid, we tend to look at mission work in terms of funds available and projects funded. Yet, basically, that is what mission is, but it doesn't stop there. Mission projects are evangelism in action. The projects funded with your mission funds probably reach just as many - if not more - souls than the "Bible Believing Television Minister of Brother Doe."

So the "E" work is alive and well in Presbyterianism and it manifests itself in the tangible form of mission projects.

### BOOK NOOK submitted by Joy Kaufmann, GP

When The Rev. Dr. E. Stanley Ott preached at the General Presbyter's installation service a couple of years ago, he mentioned that he had written a book. It is actually a quite good book, potentially helpful to all our congregations. Dr. Ott titled it Twelve Dynamic Shifts for Transforming Your Church. His premise is that most Presbyterian Church (USA) congregations are mature, in need of transformation and revitalization, and that there are practical shifts in thinking and behavior that we can make together in order to start those processes. He never promises that it will be easy - just that with God's help it is possible. So what are the shifts? Here are the first six to whet your appetite... you will have to read the book to learn the other six.

1) from *your* present hopes for your congregation's future to the high expectation that *God* has a vital future for your church,

2) from merely running programs to implementing a vision for ministry,

3) from a maintenance mentality to sustaining and advancing vision,

4) from an emphasis on friendliness (eg, a handshake in church) to a *ministry* of friendliness *and* hospitality (eg, inviting visitors to do something with your family/household, such as share an in-home meal),

5) shift from assuming everyone knows how to be a disciple to intentionally developing discipleship, and

6) shift from a primary emphasis on the communal life (of those already in the church) to a balanced emphasis on both the communal and missional (reaching out to those not in the church membership) life of the church.

Dr. Ott suggests you don't try to accomplish all 12 shifts at once, but rather, through prayer and study in groups determine the one, two or three shifts your church will work on intentionally for the next year or two.

This is a book for those who want to develop the disciplines of transformation and revitalization. The Resource Center has two copies available to be borrowed.

## **A Lesson To Learn** *Submitted by Don Goss*

In her April 5, 2005 report on the status of the Presbytery, our General Presbyter mentioned the swing of the pendulum which is the focus of and guides the direction of Presbyterian, as well as other denominational, church life in the United States. She described the change of direction from church organized member ministry re: civil and social affairs of "The People of God" to one of (almost) exclusively evangelism.

History records that in this nation, brought into being under the guidance of The Holy Spirit of God, that those succeeding generations upon whom rests the hope of finally achieving the founding end and aim of this new "people of God," are resisting, even refusing their God appointed *raison d'être*.

God through Abraham established His people, *as a Holy people*, to separate them from other nations. Separate not only physically, but by the precepts they lived on earth. In Leviticus (chs 17-28), God instructed His people on how they were to achieve the abundant life as He had promised them. The society He designed included judges, "captains" and authoritative religious leaders. His instructions dealt with murder, robbery, morality, honesty and righteousness. Perhaps most significantly, God's instructions through Moses included (Ex 22, Lev 24 & Ps 149) how to deal with non-believers in their midst, *which maintains their people of God faith systems while not assimilating the practices of the non-believers*.

As people who were "anointed" leadership responsibilities re: His people, over the years after the New Covenant brought by Jesus Christ, began to be corrupted (a product of misguided and half-hearted obedience to His will. His way), God's Holy Spirit, in the 1600s, led His people to a new "promised land" - eventually called the United States of America. Through those whom He chose to lead in its founding, God once more established rules of governance - The Constitution, which established protections of the right for His people to build a society which thrives in the precepts it established - *but only to the extent that His people apply themselves to its preservation!*.

## **"It Works For Us:" Workshop Rotation**

When I began volunteering as a Sunday school teacher, I soon learned that the Sunday School Rotation approach was a wonderful way to teach children about the bible. At that time Pastor Dave Benfer provided the material for the topics each month and the teachers took the topic and created a 4 or 5 week lesson plan.

When our Pastor became ill in 2003, we had to quickly find a curriculum that we could manage without his assistance. After a try with a traditional -style material, I began searching for a curriculum that supported the rotation style of teaching.

With the help of Deanine Shipman from the State College Church, we found a curriculum called Power Xpress from Cokesbury. It is made especially for the rotation style of teaching and included a plan to cover the New Testament and Old Testament over a four year period.

Wow! We purchased a lesson for the first month and have been using it ever since. Our children have grown to love the program and it is set up so it requires a minimal time commitment from our teachers. Each monthly program comes with 8 lessons to choose from. There are art, science, music, games, storytelling, cooking, computer, and video elements. We choose 4 or 5 lessons depending on the number of weeks in the month and the children rotate through each one, learning the same subject in 4 or 5 different methods with 4 or 5 different teachers. It allows our teachers to choose a topic that they are comfortable teaching and enjoy preparing the lesson. I make copies of the lessons for each of the teachers to distribute at our monthly staff meeting so that the original is preserved to be used again once we complete the 48 months of the program. All I can say is that we love Rotation Sunday School at Petersburg Bethel, and... it works for us!

If you would like to learn more about the rotation style of teaching, you may contact Marie Carlson at the Multi-Media Resource Center (814-742-2200) and request a book called "Workshop Rotation A New Model for Sunday School". She has also purchased the first month of the Power Xpress program called "Dig Into the Bible" if you would like to review the curriculum for yourself
