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TO CHANGE OR NOT TO CHANGE... THAT IS THE QUESTION

Have you ever noticed how we Christians proclaim a new life in Christ... and then refuse to change? That's curious, isn't it? Even the most creative among us occasionally runs up against the traditions, the values, the ways of doing things that others in our congregations simply assume are inviolate... and therefore not to be questioned.

There are good reasons for this. First, most of us are convinced that God is pleased with how we are the church, so we assume we must hold on at all costs to what we feel certain is precious to God. Second, none of us likes to face the possible loss of what is precious to us. That includes trusted, valued, assumed ways of doing activities. This holds true in all our congregations and it holds true at our beloved Camp Krislund.

In times of transition, as when a key staff person moves on, or major capital projects are foreseen, or large programmatic shifts occur (from children & youth camping for two months to all ages & stages on a 12-month cycle), the tendency to try to hold on to the familiar is, well, all too familiar. But change we must, to meet faithfully the challenges of a new era.

Why is it so difficult to envision ways of being the Camp (or the church, for that matter) that meet current challenges faithfully and effectively? It is all about adaptive and not technical change.

Technical change has to do with the simple things: we need new stationary, so we go out and buy new stationary. We need the sidewalks to be shoveled, so we determine whether to use hand-held shovels or a snow-blower. Technical change has to do with how we do tasks that haven't really changed all that much and don't need to change.

Then there is adaptive change. This has to do with having a gap between what we know we need and our current situation. It has to do with asking large groups of decision makers to step up to the plate to make tough choices rather than relying on trusted authority figures to make the choices for them. It requires a lot more facts than doing "same old, same old" requires. The decision makers also need to give themselves permission to disagree with one another without taking it (or making it) personal. These things are not easy for most of us to do.

But do them we must, for the sake of the beloved ministry we have had for children and youth through Camp Krislund, and for the sake of adding effective ministry settings for persons of all other ages. Please pray for your Camp board as we seek to live into adaptive change.

Pastor McGaffin officiated at the weddings of both their children and baptized their grandson.

But more than that, Pastor Doug encouraged Paul to become a commissioned lay pastor, along with Paul’s friend Mark Rhodes.

Paul is especially grateful to Pastor McGaffin for his encouragement and guidance in becoming a CLP. What better men-

tor could anyone want—Reverend McGaffin has been ministering to his flock at Ward Avenue for thirty years! Paul and Sue have been faithful members of the Ward Avenue church since 1984.

PASTORS! CHURCHES! CHECK OUT THIS LILLY FOUNDATION GRANT

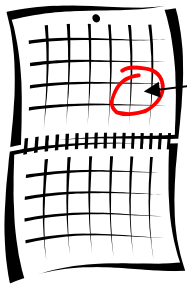
First Presbyterian Church of Philipsburg has received a grant of \$45,000 to enable its pastor, Tracie Bullis, to participate in the 2008 National Clergy Renewal Program funded by the Indianapolis-based Lilly Endowment Inc. The church is one of 133 congregations across the country that will support their pastors in the program, which allows pas-

tors to step back from their busy lives and renew their spirits for the benefit of their ongoing ministry.

Now in its ninth year, the program invites congregations and pastors to consider and plan a period of intentional reflection and renewal. The grant provides a time for pastors to take a break from the daily obligations and gain the fresh perspective

and renewed energy that a carefully considered “Sabbath time” of travel, study, rest and prayer can provide. Each congregation is eligible to apply for a grant of up to \$45,000. Up to \$15,000 of that amount can be used to fulfill pastoral duties during the minister’s absence and for expenses related to the congregation’s own renewal. The 133 grants this year total nearly \$5,000,000 and represent 20 denominations in 36 states.

First Presbyterian Church of Philipsburg plans to use the grant to send their pastor and her family on renewing travel trips. Pastor Tracie Bullis will spend a week on retreat, followed by three weeks for the family in Greece learning more about the Apostle Paul’s church plantings from the New Testament. The family will then visit Pastor Tracie’s relatives in Oregon, attend a pastor’s conference, and take a retreat in Montana. From the West Coast, the family will next travel to Thailand to visit the small but

THE RHYTHM OF THE SYNOD

The Rev. Dr. Susan Faye Wonderland was unanimously called as Synod Associate Executive during the third stated meeting in the 291st year of the Synod of the Trinity. Dr. Wonderland is currently serving as the Interim Executive Presbyter for the Presbytery of Lackawanna. She will begin serving the Synod on March 1, 2009.

Mary Speedy (Elder, Carlisle) was re-elected to serve as the 2009 Synod Moderator and Neal Galley (Clergy, Redstone) was elected as the 2009 Vice-Moderator.

The Rev. Dr. Bruce Stevens, Synod Executive, reported that 100 churches in the Synod are now involved in church transformation programs. He said that the hope of thriving as a missional Synod is alive and well and productive. New clusters of churches committed to transformation are already working on plans for 2009.

Lawrence Davis (Elder, Philadelphia), Chairperson of Synod Finance and Budget Committee, gave a detailed report on the 2009 budget. This balanced budget was approved with one amendment. Chantal Atnip, Synod Treasurer, reported that the first dividend from Brotherhood Insurance is over \$12,000 and will be distributed proportionately among the participating churches and church camps.

Mary Marks King (Clergy, Kiskiminetas) reported for the Leadership Development Coordinating Team. Their work is moving along well as they discern the areas that most immediately

need to be addressed by Leadership Development.

Commissioners approved a recommendation from the Grants and Scholarship Committee to limit Synod of the Trinity Educational Scholarships (STES) to Presbyterian students living in the bounds of the Synod of the Trinity applying to, or enrolled in, any accredited institution of higher education and who have a demonstrated financial need and a commitment to Presbyterian leadership.

Five Mission Development Resources Committee grants (MDRC) were approved: Day Camp (Pittsburgh); Arabic Ministries (Lehigh); Vietnamese Fellowship (Pittsburgh); Hispanic Ministries (Donegal); Upper Room New Church Development (Pittsburgh).

The new DVD, "Room at the Table", was viewed and will be widely distributed so that people have an idea of what the Synod does, the Synod's place in the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.), and how Presbyterians might be involved in serving God through the work of the Synod. The DVD was filmed and produced by Presbyterian Media Mission.

The next meeting of the Synod will be held March 19-20, 2009 in the Presbytery of Lehigh.

HIGHLIGHTS OF NOVEMBER 18, 2008 PRESBYTERY MEETING

The highlights of the November 18 presbytery meeting included the sharing of the Lord's Supper and a sermon by Rev. Jim Thomas, reminding us that God's message never changes, but the presentation of that message must be constantly reformed and ever reforming. Rev. Bruce Stevens, synod executive, then explained a program to develop missional congregations, congregations who

know their purpose for Jesus Christ. Rev. Chuck Curley introduced the four proposed ecumenical agreements which will be voted on at the January presbytery meeting. Treasurer Liz Armstrong presented the October financial statement and reassured presbytery that our income and expenses are in line. Presbytery filled vacancies on presbytery committees, class of 2011, renewed several pastoral contracts, and dissolved the call of Rev.

Duncan Nichol with MountainTop Parish. Rev. Nichol has accepted a call in Nebraska. Meeting dates for 2009 presbytery meetings were set for January 31 at State College; March 31 at Bedford; June 23 at Clearfield; September 29 at Bellefonte; and November 17 at Krislund.

GREETINGS FROM THE POTTER CLAN IN CHIANG MAI, THAILAND

The past two months have been filled with many blessings from God, and we are very thankful and thank all of you for your prayers and your recent financial gifts.

Lance was able to find replacement teachers for a couple that needed to leave without too much substitute teacher time for the students. Several people have had perfect timing by walking into Lance's office and offering words of encouragement and/or praise, just when it was needed. Debbie went on a weekend retreat with 200 women from Chiang Mai at a resort in the mountains. The speaker was Judy Clark, an old friend that we visited last year on Prince Edward Island. She spoke on how a specific type of healing prayer had transformed her life and how she had since used it on many others with positive results. A few weeks prior Debbie heard a sermon that didn't sit well with her and she had been praying for peace from God about the truth or untruth of the sermon. She was rewarded with God's love and peace washing over and dancing within her on the last day of the retreat during a soaking prayer session. (She was soaking up God, no water was involved.)

Our family went on a trip to Malaysia during October break (a great idea we highly endorse), combining work and play, to Dalat International School and learned many good things that we hope will benefit our school in the coming years. Dalat is on the beach in Penang so the girls enjoyed the beach and the hotel pool. Elizabeth, Riley, and Callie continue to thrive. Jenae is clinging on tightly to her mommy, but her comfort zone is expanding and she's her enchanting self within her comfort zone. We thank God for friends and family and we are blessed with the knowledge that with God all things are possible. We will miss our Thanksgiving tradition with family in Pennsylvania,

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but we're hopeful that we will start something new here to treasure. Soon the Christmas season will be upon us, and while there will be no snow, there will still be the awe of Christ Jesus and his birth and all that that means to us.

The cool season has mercifully arrived. It came literally overnight and now nighttime temperatures dip into the 60s and daytime highs only reach the 80s. We recently also experienced Loy Kratong. This is the Buddhist festival of atonement. Buddhists send their sins down river in quaint floats made from banana tree cross sections decorated with leaves, flowers and candles. They also send them into the air in cylindrical balloons about 3-4 feet tall powered by a burning candle. A noisy accompaniment during this 4 day festival is the excessive use of fireworks and firecrackers well into the wee hours of the night. What a comfort it is to know that through Jesus Christ our sins are forgiven whenever we ask, not just once a year.

Thanks again for all of your prayers, they are working, please keep it up, we need them every day. If you would like to support us with prayer please pray for reasonable work hours for Lance, and abundant patience for him towards his staff; continued good health for our family; and an ever-expanding comfort zone for Jenae, who now admits to having at least one friend her own age.

growing Christian churches there with which Presbyterian churches in the central Pennsylvania have formed a partnership of support and mutual learning. When the family returns in late August, Pastor Tracie will close her sabbatical time with a final week on retreat.

"In our religion grant-making, we hope to strengthen the efforts of today's excellent pastors because it is no secret that pastors who have reconnected themselves to the passions that led them to the ministry in the first place are more likely to lead healthy and vibrant congregations," Dykstra said.
