*"After this, the Lord appointed seventy others and sent them on ahead of him in pairs to every town and place where he himself intended to go. He said to them, 'The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few; therefore, ask the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers into his harvest. Go on your way. See, I am sending you out like lambs in the midst of wolves.'"*  
Luke 10:1-3

This article is being written in the middle of the synod mission funding consultation, a conversation between the 16 presbyteries of our synod about what the purpose of mission is in our time and what kinds of mission we can only carry out or best accomplish by working and funding together. We've just heard inspiring stories of presbytery missions, some carried out through the presbyteries and still more carried out by member congregations. We have studied Scripture together, especially Luke 10:1-12.

When Jesus came on earth, he first gathered his faithful people around him. He taught, and healed and preached. He exhorted people to repent from their old, sinful, God-rejecting ways and to turn to him with faith and hope and trust. In this turning, they, and we, come to know the life and light that is salvation.

Toward the end of his earthly ministry, Jesus started sending followers out to share the good

news message with others. Thus the church, from its earliest days, became both a people gathered to worship God and a people sent on a mission into a hurting world. The disciples of Jesus became not just people who did good things in Jesus name, although they were that. They were also a people who lived the mission of sharing him in word and deed.

These days I think a lot about our churches. I see those that are thriving and those that are struggling, those that are joyful in sharing the good news through worship and action and those that are pondering what their purpose is. Jesus still calls us to be a people gathered in worship and a people sent out in mission.

As Luke 10 points out, the harvest belongs to God, and not to the laborers. We are called to pray that God will send out "laborers" (might that be us?) into his harvest.

## FROM THE POTTER FAMILY IN THAILAND

We apologize for missing the last Agape Herald. Much has happened since we last wrote. Perhaps most significantly, at the end of January Lance fractured a vertebra in his back playing basketball. He is recovering well, though the first week he spent in the hospital in pain and discomfort. The second week he spent in his own hospital bed in our house attended by nurse Debbie. He was able to answer some email and even interviewed job applicants by phone. The third week Lance could move around some. The fourth week, he returned to work in the mornings and has gradually increased his workload to the point that he is now working full time. He is still more comfortable standing than sitting and has a podium in his office to stand at and lean on during meetings. We felt blessed during Lance's recovery to receive so much support in prayer, visitors, and help. Lance's folks happened to arrive the day after Lance injured himself and the day before he went into the hospital. They were a big help just by being present as well as by running errands, taking kids to

school, and entertaining visitors. Lance still wears a back brace and must limit his activities until May. We believe people's prayers helped Lance rest and recover with peace of mind and sustained Debbie during this stressful time.

My heart burst with joy this weekend when I watched two young men, who had to leave CMIS for bad grades and a minor drug offense respectively, star in our school's terrific production of *Seussical!* Another student, an adopted Thai girl with HIV who had to leave CMIS because of limited academic abilities also performed in the show. Our learning support team created a modified program for her this year so she could remain involved in the school community she treasured so much. An atmosphere of forgiveness, support, and accountability allowed these students not only to return to school, but to thrive. Praise God!

Living in a foreign country where our very appearance sets us apart from the

local people, we are keenly aware of the many critical eyes that are upon us. Today Lance was outside washing the car with the girls. For virtually the whole time, they were watched by a young Thai couple and others. This serves as a vivid example of one of our roles here as Christians in this largely Buddhist country. We are watched with interest everywhere we go and in everything we do. How we reflect God's influence in our lives is therefore very important. Especially at work, teachers, students, and families of a host of faiths or no faith, look to see how we will act in any given situation. We look to God for guidance and our Christian colleagues here for support as we try to do our best in God's service and for all concerned with CMIS. Of course we are not perfect in our attempts, but God often does amazing things through imperfect people.

Wouldn't it be a wonderful service to God if all of us were keenly aware of our influence for God in our own communities, even in America, where we may not look different from our neighbors but because we believe in the living example of Jesus Christ we know we should be different? We encourage you to be a difference for God in your community today. Thank you for your continued prayers and support.
