BOARD OF PENSIONS REGIONAL BENEFITS UPDATE

Three persons from our presbytery, Liz Armstrong, Doug Friant, and Joy Kaufmann, recently attended the annual Board of Pensions Regional Benefits Event in Tampa, FL. The Board staff shared lots of information about pastors' and other plan members' benefits. So here, in no particular order, are some of the tidbits our representatives to the event picked up.

Long-Term Care Insurance Open Enrollment – If you needed long-term care, could your household afford it? Or would you need to spend down all your life savings until you qualified for federal benefits? The BoP is offering long-term care insurance through CNA, without needing to prove good health, from now through May 31. There are four levels of daily benefits available. The premiums will be based upon the Plan member's age and amount of coverage chosen.

The still new Website – The BoP reworked its website last year. There are several new features. Go to www.pensions.org to find the webpage. You can find forms for life stages and events, a page for treasurers and administrators, various calculators (dues, Total Effective Salary, optional death coverage, optional dental coverage and simple savings), and various interesting and informative features. Go play with the webpage! It's fun.

Smart Choices 24-hour Nurse Line – 24/7 nurse consultation available at 800-237-3015.

CIGNA Behaviorial Health – up to six free phone counseling phone calls, confidential counseling/referral

service, financial and legal help, even help with pet-sitting – 866-640-2772.

Electronic newsletters – weekly newsletters about maintaining good health/reducing risk factors and a weekly recipe

Nationwide Median Effective Salary – for pastors, the 2009 median is \$50,800. This is a key number, because if a pastor earns below the median, upon that pastor's retirement or disability, the denomination "pulls the pastor up" to denominational median for benefits calculation. It truly is the larger churches carrying the smaller churches in order that all the servants of the church receive a decent living amount in retirement or disability.

Pension Plan Funding – At yearend, in spite of the terrible market year, the pension plan was still fully funded. While our funds went down along with everyone else's, we were still better than major market indices in almost every case. The Plan is extremely well managed.

Liz Armstrong is our presbytery's Board of Pension liaison, so if you have questions at any time during the year about the BoP and the benefits it offers its members, please do not hesitate to call the presbytery office and ask for Liz. The number at the office is 814-742-2200.

Greetings from Chiang Mai, Thailand. As we write this, we are well into the hot season here and any and every breeze or raindrop is welcome. Unfortunately they are few and far between. However, by the middle of June the rainy season will be well underway and the heat will get doused every now and again by rain.

It has been a difficult first year for Lance. There were many positive experiences and confirmations that he was really called to be here, but also there have been some negative episodes as well. He has faced re-

sistant and at times unprofessional staff members, a lack of policies and procedure to guide the running of the school, no administrative assistant, and his incapacitating back injury. We are encouraged, however, by the prayers of those both here and back in Pennsylvania, a supportive school board, and the prospect of some experienced, mature, Christian teachers joining the staff next year. Lance could not have asked for a better hiring season and we are convinced that God’s hand is at work bringing the type of people to Chiang Mai International School that will help it grow into the type of school that will bring honor and glory to God and pro-

vide a first rate international school education to its students.

The Thai school year begins in May and ends in March, but the school calendar for Chiang Mai International School follows closer to the one you’re familiar with in PA. That said, Lance is very busy with the end of school year activities and has just completed hiring the teachers needed for next year. Our three oldest children (Elizabeth, Riley, and Jenaë) are finishing their school year great experiences and all four (including Callie) are excited about the coming school year too, which is great news as a parent.

EXCERPTS FROM A LETTER TO HIS CONGREGATION FROM PASTOR LOU NYIRI, JCCC MEMBER

The JCCC wants you to know that the first ministry goal we have is to provide a first class summer Christian camping experience which is relevant for the young people who will attend Krislund this summer.

Our second ministry goal is to provide a conference center where clergy and laity can find ongoing Christian education, spiritual development and nurture.

Our third ministry goal is to provide a ministry of comprehensive hospitality to outside groups.

The JCCC recognizes and realizes that they have an obligation to provide oversight and accountability for the overwhelming financial support of the three presbyteries that give to Krislund.
