CONSENT AGENDA

What is a consent agenda?

A consent agenda is made up of items that may be considered routine business that need action, but are unlikely to require debate. Items for inclusion on the consent agenda must be sent out in advance with the pre-presbytery mailing and clearly marked for the consent agenda.

Why is a consent agenda useful?

When the consent agenda is called for, the moderator will call for a motion to approve the entire consent agenda in one vote, thus saving presbytery time for items requiring more discussion.

BUT What if I wish to debate, discuss, ask for clarification on some part of the consent agenda?

Simply, rise to be recognized and request that that item be removed from the consent agenda. One person's request is all that is required. No second is required, no vote need be taken to remove the item.

Do not give the explanation of your concern, need for clarification, points to be emphasized or opposed at this time. The item will come up for consideration at the time when the remainder of that committee's report is made, and you will be afforded the opportunity to speak to the motion at that time.

INDEPENDENT ACCOUNTANTS'S REVIEW REPORT

Board of Directors The Presbytery of Huntingdon, Inc. Tyrone, Pennsylvania

We have reviewed the accompanying financial statements of The Presbytery of Huntingdon, Inc. (the Presbytery), which comprise the statement of assets, liabilities and net assets - modified cash basis as of December 31, 2023, the related statements of revenue, expenses and changes in net assets - modified cash basis and functional expenses - modified cash basis for the year then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements. A review includes primarily applying analytical procedures to management's financial data and making inquiries of management. A review is substantially less in scope than an audit, the objective of which is the expression of an opinion regarding the financial statements as a whole. Accordingly, we do not express such an opinion.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with the modified cash basis of accounting; this includes determining that the modified cash basis of accounting is an acceptable basis for the preparation of financial statements in the circumstances. Management is also responsible for the design, implementation and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Accountant's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to conduct the review engagement in accordance with Statements on Standards for Accounting and Review Services promulgated by the Accounting and Review Services Committee of the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants. Those standards require us to perform procedures to obtain limited assurance as a basis for reporting whether we are aware of any material modifications that should be made to the financial statements for them to be in accordance with the modified cash basis of accounting. We believe the results of our procedures provide a reasonable basis for our conclusion.

We are required to be independent of the Presbytery and to meet our other ethical responsibilities, in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements related to our reviews.

Accountant's Conclusion

d on our review, we are not aware of any material modifications that should be made to the accompanying financial statements in order for them to be in accordance with the modified cash basis of accounting.

Basis of Accounting

We draw attention to Note 1 of the financial statements, which describes the basis of accounting. The financial statements are prepared in accordance with the modified cash basis of accounting, which is a basis of accounting other than accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. Our conclusion is not modified with respect to this matter.

Other Matter - Supplementary Information

The supplementary information referenced in the Contents is presented for the purpose of additional analysis and is not a required part of the basic financial statements. Such information is the responsibility of management and was derived from, and relates directly to, the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements. The supplementary information has been subjected to the review procedures applied in our review of the basic financial statements. We are not aware of any material modifications that should be made to the supplementary information. We have not audited the supplementary information and do not express an opinion on such information.

COMMITTEE ON MINISTRY JUNE 18, 2024 REPORT

FOR ACTION:

The Committee on Ministry recommends that presbytery approve the following motions:

1: LaMarr Adamson & DuBois First United: COM recommends that presbytery:

- a. Approve a renewal of the temporary supply contract for pastoral services between ruling elder LaMarr Adamson and the session of the First United Presbyterian Church of DuBois for a period of up to twelve months, beginning July 1, 2024.
- b. Grant a commission to ruling elder LaMarr Adamson to be commissioned pastor and moderator of the First United Presbyterian Church. Ruling elder LaMarr Adamson remains a member of the First United Presbyterian Church.
- d. Authorize ruling elder LaMarr Adamson as the commissioned pastor of the First United Presbyterian Church to administer the Lord's Supper, administer the sacrament of baptism, moderate the session of the First United Presbyterian Church, and have voice and vote in meetings of presbytery (such vote to be counted as a ruling elder commissioner).
- e. Authorize ruling elder LaMarr Adamson to perform a service of Christian marriage of members of the congregation or of the local community when invited by the session. Such service may only be performed within the geographical bounds of the presbytery. In performing such service of Christian marriage, the commissioned pastor shall follow all provisions of the Directory for Worship regarding marriage.
- f. The agreement may be terminated by any of the three parties, by giving thirty (30) days written notice from the session or from the commissioned pastor or from the Committee on Ministry.
- g. Appoint the Rev. Gary Califf as the commissioned pastor's mentor and supervisor.

All required background checks have been submitted. (For full text of contract, see COM minutes, June 14, 2023, pp.75-76, 78.)

Expectations of CP:

Time expectations are 10 hours per week to include Sunday worship

Conduct 28 Sunday worship services per year, plus special services such as on Ash Wednesday,

Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, Easter sunrise, and Christmas Eve.

Visit shut-ins, hospitalized members, and nursing home residents.

Officiate at baptisms, Lord's Supper and funerals

Moderate session and congregational meetings.

Attend worship team meetings

Attend other team meetings at his discretion

Organize adult education programs and explore other C.E. opportunities.

COMMITTEE ON PRESBYTERY LIFE REPORT June 18, 2024

FOR ACTION:

The Committee on Presbytery Life recommends that Presbytery approve the following recommendations:

1. **Session Records Review**: That presbytery set the date for the 2024 session records review as Tuesday October 1, 9:30 a.m., in clusters and Tuesday, October 8, 9:30 a.m. for the Centre region and makeup.

ANNUAL CORPORATE MEETING

2. **2023 Full Financial Review**: That presbytery grant Mr. David Bourne of Boyer & Ritter accountancy firm permission to speak and that presbytery receive the 2023 Full Financial Review of our finances.

FOR INFORMATION:

- 1. **Insurance:** COPL reviewed our presbytery insurance and decided to retain our current provider Church Mutual.
- 2. **Joseph & Helen Irvine Fund income**: CoPL designated \$152.24 from the Irvine fund to go to Krislund for transportation and handling of the plastic caps that have been collected.
- 3. **Outreach Mission Project**: CoPL made \$5,000 available to the Visioning Committee from the Brotherhood Mutual rebate (\$13,000 currently available, with an additional \$3,000 anticipated) for use of the Outreach Mission Project until the Synod grant is received, with funding advanced by the presbytery to be repaid from the grant.
- 4. **Krislund Bottlecap Transportation funding** CoPL made up to \$5,000 from the Brotherhood Mutual rebate available to Krislund Camp & Conference Center for transportation costs to take the remaining bottlecaps to Indiana and bring back tables. Krislund to be encouraged to fundraise for this purpose as well and repay loan to Huntingdon Presbytery. If Krislund does not, then loan to be forgiven.
- 5. **Centre Hill Cemetery**: Mowing will be done by Preston Gaddes again. Funding from Goodhart and Rearick trusts.
- 6. **Hunger Funds:** have been dispersed.
- 7. **Pahk 5 Nan mission partnership gift:** authorized the 2024 gift (Mission Budget \$3,100) be sent to the Pahk.
- 8. **Instructions for technology and Zoom at presbytery meetings**: Instructions will go in every presbytery packet (the insert may differ each meeting to adjust to the circumstances of each host church.) Folks who plan to use WIFI at a presbytery meeting must bring their own hot spot as church WIFI is not capable of supporting a large number of simultaneous users.

ROBERT LEE ZORN [Burnham, Milroy, Vira, Lewistown]

Bob Zorn never strayed far from his roots in Fayette County, Pennsylvania, where he was born to Frank Adam and Bess Zorn in August 1930. Raised on a dairy and chicken farm, he learned lifeskills from being a farmer—steadiness, faithfulness, fulfilment of commitment—that stood him as good guides as he grew. He graduated from Waynesburg College in 1953 and married his Presbyterian senior high camp sweetheart Carol Taylor whom he met in 1945. One of those campers shepherded at those camps was our Sam Strohm.

Bob already felt the call to ministry and entered Western Theological Seminary (now Pittsburgh T.S.) immediately after marrying Carol. During seminary, he served as student pastor at the Pleasant Hills Parish of Dunbar, Laurel Hill, Leisenring, Tyrone, and West Leisenring. He was ordained by Redstone Presbytery on May 27, 1956.

On April 22, 1958, Bob was received the first time into Huntingdon Presbytery, accepting a call to the much more compact Westminster Parish, consisting then of Burnham, Vira, and Milroy, where he was installed on May 16. Although they had three small children by this time, the Zorns were both active in our presbytery. Carol Zorn was Children's Work Adviser for the Christian Education Committee, while Bob served on the Program subcommittee of the Christian Education Committee and the Nominating Committee in his first years. He was quickly named to the Camp & Conference Committee in 1960, which was exploring sites to purchase for what became Krislund Camp & Conference Center. And, he stuck through weeds and woods to run the first week of campers when it was ready to go.

He even chaired the Session Records Review in 1961 when the duly elected chair was unable to finish his duties. He was a Synod Commissioner in 1961. Well-liked and dependable, Bob was elected Vice Moderator of presbytery for 1966, a year in which the Moderator was frequently absent. He was elected a commissioner to General Assembly to the 1966 Assembly which spent much of its energy on what became the Confession of 67. He became the interpreter of the Confession to our presbytery.

Elder Bill Knepp (Milroy) has told of Bob's impact on his life. When Bill was a soldier during the Vietnam War, he had a weekend pass from his base in Georgia. Bill wanted to get home to Pennsylvania to see his girl, which distance exceeded the limits of his pass. Nonetheless, Bill came home and, during the visit, proposed to his girlfriend Arlene, now his wife of over fifty years. Bill & Arlene asked Bob Zorn to officiate at their wedding. Without telling Bill, Bob then called Bill's company commander and requested an extension of his leave to that Bob could marry Arlene and Bill immediately. The commander then spoke to Bill and told him the worst punishment the commander could think of to impose for Bill's exceeding the distance limitations on his pass was to make him get married! As Elder Bill Sisson (Lewistown PC) said, there are three things that characterize Bob Zorn: Gentleness, kindness, and his sense of humor, all of which come from his living out the Gospel.

Gentleness, kindness and sense of humor do indeed spring forth from a Gospel life, but Bob knew a demanding Gospel. He was a child of the sixties after all. Shortly after he left Milroy (He was dismissed to Lake Erie Presbytery August 31, 1968, to accept the voke of Tidioute and Irvine.) he was asked by the Warren Times-Mirror and Observer, for a sermon to print on the religion page. He drew on his agricultural background to pull out the application of Luke 12:54-56. Christ points out that farmers' lives depend upon interpreting natural signs—a cloud in the west means rain is coming and a wind from the south will bring heat. You see it and you know what will happen. But, Christ calls out, "What hypocrites you are! You know how to interpret the appearance of the earth and the sky; how is it that you cannot interpret this fateful hour!" That was in New Testament times. Now, Bob said, "War clouds hang heavy upon the horizon constantly threatening death and destruction. The hot, seething cities give forth the distant thunder of racial unrest. The lightning of violence flashes again and again across the countryside...Such signs thus in evidence; it is time we read them, discuss them, and act, or react to them. We must pray for and plan for peace. We must practice better race relationships and respect human rights. . . We must understand the anatomy of violence. We must individually and collectively oppose crime and support justice." ["What Hypocrites You Are!", Warren Times-Mirror and Observer, June 28, 1969, 20.]

Twenty-five years later, when Bob returned to this presbytery, he wrote in his Statement of Faith, "As for my personal beliefs, I would stress the omnipotence of God, the power of the person of Jesus Christ, salvation by grace, and the continual work of the Holy Spirit among us. I understand some of the major issues in the world today to be the tension between affluence and poverty, the conflict between war and peace, and the battle between good and evil. The church must, of course, continually champion the cause of peace, of right, and of justice. Above all, the church must examine itself in light of scripture and

continue to be the catalyst which melds the world into a peaceable, harmonious society." [Statement of faith, November 1993]

On November 16, 1993, Bob returned to this presbytery from Lake Erie, as an honorably retired pastor with nearly forty years of experience. He settled in a pew at the Lewistown Presbyterian Church, where he was asked to serve as a Parish Associate of Visitation. Those qualities of gentleness, kindness, and sense of humor shone forth. Now, most observant Presbyterians recognize that a pastor's life is full of stress. A human being needs a little help along the way. Apart from his family, particularly wife Carol, Bob had a unique pastime that he found in this presbytery. From the early nurturing of an interest in whitling by Boy Scouts as a child, Bob found a friend and mentor in Milroy with an Amish master carver. Mr. Snyder shared the fine points of carving fans and angels and a chain from a solid block of wood. When Bob returned to this presbytery, he supported Krislund Camp's fundraising efforts with hand carved flowers. He carved bouquets to adorn the silk floral arrangements made by Carol Auker to beautify the Lewistown sanctuary, along with bowls, complete with fruit. It was an excellent outlet for stress and tension, that created its own gentleness and kindness. It was almost a shock when Bob asked to be relieved of his visitation duties to realize he had served over twenty years in that position, a longevity most pastors would covet. He was honored and made parish associate emeritus on November 9, 2019.

This time the retirement was for real, although he continued to enjoy the friendships of those he had served. His frailties, including a leaky replacement heart valve and fractured bones, could not be overcome. He died on May 24, 2024. He was survived by his wife Carol and three of their four children.
