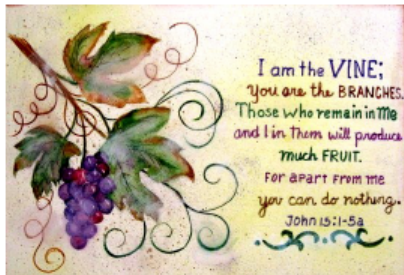

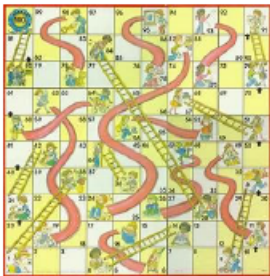

Alleviating Hunger and Eliminating Its Causes

“Enslaving poverty in a world of abundance is an intolerable violation of God’s good creation.”—Book of Confessions, 9.46



Fighting hunger is at the heart of our Presbyterian understanding of mission. Jesus fed the hungry and told his disciples to do the same. Yet, we know that hunger is an extremely complex phenomenon with economic, political and social causes. A local congregation can make a huge impact on local hunger. Thankfully Presbyterian churches are feeding hungry people in their neighborhoods with food pantries, soup kitchens, community meals, community gardens, backpack programs and more. This important hunger ministry is vital to people who are hungry today. As the national Presbyterian Hunger Program we celebrate this vital work of local congregations and we complement it by doing “root cause” work to help address the underlying questions of why people are hungry in order to reduce ongoing hunger.

When the world tolerates the vicious suffering of hungry people, the church is called to speak out and share all that we have. When powers and principalities regularize exploitation, the church stands with the exploited and witnesses to the fullness of life God intends for all. When people are made poor and vulnerable or reduced to objects of pity, the church builds relationships of dignity and equality among all. Even at the risk of losing its own life, the church is called to point beyond ourselves to the new reality in Christ. Praying and working with Presbyterians and other partners, that it may be “on earth as it is in heaven” the Presbyterian Hunger Program helps the church respond to the violence of hunger and poverty.

Presbyterian Hunger Program’s mission is clear: alleviate hunger and eliminate its causes. There is no one size fits all solution. PHP complements the work of Presbyterian congregations through strategic partnership collaborations, print and web educational and worship materials, and participatory programs so that Presbyterians Go, Join, and Act to end hunger for our neighbors next door and across the planet.

We approach hunger holistically with 5 tools:

- Direct Food Relief combined with Root Cause Work
- Sustainable Development
- Advocacy
- Intentional and Sustainable Living
- Education

CONSENT AGENDA

What is a consent agenda?

A consent agenda is made up of items that may be considered routine business that need action, but are unlikely to require debate. Items for inclusion on the consent agenda must be sent out in advance with the pre-presbytery mailing and clearly marked for the consent agenda.

Why is a consent agenda useful?

When the consent agenda is called for, the moderator will call for a motion to approve the entire consent agenda in one vote, thus saving presbytery time for items requiring more discussion.

BUT What if I wish to debate, discuss, ask for clarification on some part of the consent agenda?

Simply, rise to be recognized and request that that item be removed from the consent agenda. One person's request is all that is required. No second is required, no vote need be taken to remove the item.

Do not give the explanation of your concern, need for clarification, points to be emphasized or opposed at this time. The item will come up for consideration at the time when the remainder of that committee's report is made, and you will be afforded the opportunity to speak to the motion at that time.

**COMMITTEE ON PRESBYTERY LIFE
REPORT
NOVEMBER 6, 2021**

The Committee on Presbytery Life recommends that presbytery approve the following motions:

1. **Upper Spruce Creek:** That presbytery approve the project of the session of Upper Spruce Creek to create a Meditation Garden along the edge of its property next to Spruce Creek. Work has begun on clearing a section of Spruce Creek. It has a letter from the state saying no permit is needed. The first stage has been agreed on at a cost of up to \$16,000 for clearing brush, and stump and dead tree removal. The session has ample funds on hand to complete the project.
2. **November 5, 2022 presbytery meeting:** That presbytery accept the invitation of the State College Presbyterian Church to hold the November 5 presbytery meeting there. (This is an away football day.)

BYLAWS REVISION

Motion: That the presbytery approve the revision of the bylaws as above.

Note: This is a second reading, so a vote will be taken. It requires a two-thirds majority for passage. The first reading was done at the September 28, 2021 meeting. The purpose of the proposed revisions is to authorize the presbytery to meet electronically when it so chooses.

Article V Meetings of the Members

Section 1. **Annual Meetings:**

a. Means: Meetings of the members and meetings of the Corporation may be held in person or by any means of technology that provides conditions of opportunity for simultaneous aural communications among all participating members. Such technology may include, but is not limited to, use of conference telephone or electronic video screen. Participation in a meeting through use of conference telephone or electronic video screen, etc., constitutes participation at a meeting as long as all participants in the meeting are able to hear one another

b. **Annual Corporate Meeting:** The annual meeting of the Corporation shall be held at a stated meeting of the Presbytery prior to the end of June. Corporate business may be conducted at any stated or called meeting of the Presbytery.

Section 2. **Special Meetings:** *Special meetings of the members may be called as defined in the Manual of the Presbytery of Huntingdon.* Special Corporate meetings may be called by the Trustees or the Presbytery as defined in the Book of Order of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.). All such calls shall state clearly the purpose of such meeting, and no other matter save that specified in the call may be considered.

REPRESENTATION REPORT 2021

Reality in central Pennsylvania is that ethnic diversity is hard to come by. The 2019 census figures for the six counties comprising the Presbytery of Huntingdon demonstrate that our population identifies as white, non-Hispanic, ranging from 90.5% to 96.7% white non-Hispanic, except for Centre County, which is the home of Penn State University, and is itself 85.4% white, non-Hispanic. Only one of our countries has a self-identified African American population that reaches 5% (Huntingdon) and only one has an equivalent Asian population (Centre). White Hispanic population does not reach a single percent in four of the six counties. Only in Mifflin County, home to a significant Amish population, is a language other than English spoken regularly in homes; in the remaining counties the percentage of homes with a language other than English predominant is so small as to be meaningless. Nor can the residents reach into their own current family stories to identify with the plight of immigrants, as the percentage of residents in the six counties who are American citizens ranges from 93.8 to 99.6 percent.

That says that encouraging inclusion and diversity in central Pennsylvania must begin with education and exposure. To that end, the Nominating Committee of the Presbytery has nominated (and presbytery elected) both of our racial-ethnic ministers to presbytery committees. Our leadership has taken the Intercultural Development Inventory to improve its ability to perceive and welcome diversity. One of our sessions has established an ongoing racial justice reading group. The Committee on Representation and Nominating Committees will continue to press the Presbytery to be not only inclusive but to be salt for the communities we live in to encourage them to also welcome persons of diverse backgrounds.
